

LAMONT GERMANY

Sports Anchor, XM-Satellite Radio, Co-Founder Heritage Sports Radio Network

Master of Ceremonies

Lamont Germany is a 30 year veteran of the broadcast industry, who has enjoyed a varied and comprehensive multi-media career on the local, regional and national level. His career path has afforded an opportunity to experience the full broadcast gamut.

The Morgan State University graduate ('80), was born in Pittsburgh, PA and was bitten by the radio bug practically at birth. His father, Albert Germany (Al Gee) was a popular Dee-Jay in Pittsburgh, and later in Washington, D.C. and New York.

Germany grew up wanting to follow in his father footsteps, and got his first broadcast opportunity while a student at Morgan State University. Under the guidance of News Director Larry Dean and Program Director Kweisi Mfume, Germany interned in the newsroom at Morgan State University owned and operated WEAA-FM.

As a student reporter, he covered the gamut; politics, crime, arts, entertainment, and sports. His experience at WEAA served as the foundation for his career after graduation.

Germany's experience at WEAA led to other broadcast opportunities, including a stint at several of the highest rated stations in the Baltimore-Washington metropolitan area WPOC (FM 93) in Baltimore, MD. And WBAL-AM in Baltimore. At WBAL, Germany enjoyed a 12 year career as a news anchor and General Assignment reporter. During his WBAL tenure, he covered Baltimore City, Baltimore County and Maryland politics.

The emergence of new technologies in the industry eventually led to a strong interest in satellite radio. Germany was hired as a Sports Anchor at Sirius-XM Satellite radio in Washington, D.C.in April of 2005. At Sirius-XM, Germany was heard on a national platform. His work could be found on the various sports channels on the platform. Germany has also freelanced in Baltimore area high school sports.

He has had the opportunity to sit behind the microphone at high school football and basketball games since 1995. And in addition to his


experience on the high school level, he's also had the privilege of serving as the primary Play by Play voice of Morgan State University athletics.

Germany has been the "Voice of Morgan" since for more than three decades.

In 2007, Germany and several partners realized a career dream with the formation of the Heritage Sports Radio Network (HSRN). The network is dedicated to the national broadcast of HBCU athletics. It affords Historic Black Colleges and Universities a platform for exposure that previously did not exist. HSRN programming can be heard on Sirius-XM radio and 30 radio stations across the country.

Lamont Germany currently resides in Parkville, Maryland.





CHARLES H. SMITH, JR.

Amateur Athletic Union President and CEO. **Keynote Speaker**

Charles H. Smith, Jr. affectionately known as "Choo" was born to Brenda and Charles H. Smith Sr. on November 30,1970 in West Baltimore. Choo is a graduate of the prestigious City College High School and earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Computer Science from his beloved University of the District of Columbia (UDC).

Choo attended Bowie State University in Maryland where he progressed to be the starting Point Guard for the Bowie Bulldogs and after his first year was recruited by Mr. Will Jones, head coach of the UDC, Firebirds where he quickly earned the starting point guard position. The Firebirds went seven games over.500 for the first time in 10 years.

Choo was honored for his exceptional basketball skills and finished his college career as the school's all-time leader in Steals and Assists. During this time Choo was voted MVP of the team, he won The Pigskin Classic Award as the "Best Player" in the region and the Reslyn W. Henry Memorial Award.

Charles "Choo" Smith graduated from the University of the District of Columbia with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Computer Science. Choo was inducted into the University of District of Columbia Athletic Hall of Fame in November 2015.

Choo played for world-renowned Original Harlem Globetrotters where he became a high-profile member of the team. As a member of the Globetrotters, he served as an Advance Ambassador.

Choo has played in all 50 States, in 26 countries and was recognized as one of the greatest dribblers in the world. Choo carries the spirit of the Harlem Globetrotters in everything he does.

Choo Smith Youth Empowerment, Inc., a non-profit organization was founded in 2007. It focuses on Choo's "4L" philosophy: "Love it, Learn it, Live it, Lead it." It is from this organization that the Choo Smith Summer Basketball Camp was born and became the platform for many other initiatives under Choo Smith Youth Empowerment, Inc.



Choo's ability to reach the youth is uncanny. He has the unique ability to reach youth on all levels; racial, socioeconomic background or gender and can generate results without compromising any of his beliefs. Choo is a man of ethics and his faith in Christ is applied in every aspect of his life.

Over the years Choo has been featured on both local and national levels and in all media outlets (print, radio, and TV). Choo has appeared on all major television networks (ABC, NBC, CBS, and Univision) and appeared on Good Fellas of Baltimore, a Fox reality show, and the new ABC Reality show "Ball Boys."

As a humanitarian, Charles "Choo" Smith has and continues to touch the lives of youth throughout Maryland and across the world.

In the Summer of 2018 Choo became the Vice President of Basketball Operations for the Young 3 organization with retired NBA legend Jerome Williams. The Young 3 is the youth and community arm of the Big 3 Professional Basketball League founded by legendary rapper Ice Cube.

Choo has received numerous awards and recognitions for his work and service in the community with children and youth.





2022 Maryland AAU Awards

MD/AAU OUSTANDING ATHLETE AWARD

The MD/AAU Outstanding Athlete Award is presented to the athlete who excelled in performance in their respective sport, used their talents to best of their abilities and was motivated to excellence in athletic endeavors.

MD/AAU COACHES AWARD

The MD/AAU Coach Award is presented to coaches that through their major commitment of time, patience, and instruction make it possible for the many MD/AAU athletes to train and successfully compete. And through their understanding ways and their knowledge of the game embrace inspiration, motivation, and dedication as the building blocks that athletes need for success in sports and life. Each Sports Director recommends their choice (from their sport) to the Banquet Chairperson.

MD/AAU "VOLUNTEER SPIRIT" AWARDS

The MD/AAU "Volunteer Spirit" Awards are presented to individuals who embrace the true meaning of "giving their time and energy to benefit others," and do so in the "spirit" of what all of AAU really stands for: a commitment and dedication to America's children to grow as individuals and become tomorrow's leaders. These volunteers, who give of themselves, can always be counted on to be there, and always bring the team spirit with them. Each Sports Director makes these recommendations (from the sport) to the Banquet Chairperson.

JOHN G. CONSIDINE - "SPORTS DIRECTOR MEMBERSHIP AWARD"

This award honors the late John Considine and is awarded to the Maryland AAU Sports Director that shows the largest percentage increase in new registrations (athletes and clubs) over the year and the most registered participants. This award promotes both his legacy and passion for involving more and more athletes and volunteers in the fun and spirit of the AAU. The Governor and Registrar finalize selection.

WILLIAM "BILL" STEVENS - "CLUB EXECUTIVE OF THE YEAR AWARD"

This award pays tribute to the sports/club Volunteer, who takes pride in the finer details of AAU paperwork and documentation in ensuring that their club is administratively signed, sealed and delivered for competition (local, state or national). Each Sports Director makes these recommendations (from their sport) to the Banquet Chairperson.

RALPH L. DURANT MEMORIAL AWARD

This award was established to give tribute to the outstanding architecting that Ralph Durant did with the Track and Field program of Baltimore City and the mentoring of youth and young adults in the program. Ralph Durant's name is synonymous with youth track and field excellence. Athletes are selected for their successes during the year's competitions in addition to their prowess at the National Junior Olympics and submitted to the Banquet Chairperson.

GOVERNOR'S AWARD

This award pays tribute to individuals who have demonstrated extraordinary leadership along with demonstrating professionalism and promoting the AAU. Each Sports Director makes recommendation (from their sport) to the Governor.

* MELVIN "MEL" PARKER MEMORIAL AWARD *

This award pays tribute to Melvin Parker, who served as the President of the Maryland District for 10 years and Boys Basketball Chairman for 10 years. The Award is given annually to the top male and female athletes who achieve a high standard of performance in AAU sanctioned district, regional, or national competition. The award will be presented to two individuals under the age of 18, in recognition of their commitment and achievement in their chosen sport. Each Sports Director submits an application for the recommendation.

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY AWARD

This award is presented to a member of the community who has demonstrated integrity, courage, and determination in overcoming adversity after which he/she has made a unique contribution to their community. The award is focuses on victims who overcome of severe life circumstances, life threatening organic diseases or impairing physical injuries. During the battle to overcome, award recipient's contribution to society must be exemplified by hard work and unselfish service. The award bears the name of Benjamin F. DuBose, who courageously battled cancer. Application Package must include a completed Application and Essay.

JOE CUCCHIARO

2021 MARYLAND LOCAL AND AAU NATIONAL VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR



Joe Cucchiaro has been an active member of the Maryland swimming community since 2007, when his six-year-old daughter started swimming competitively, to be joined the following year by Joe's younger daughter. Their first team was the Taylor Village Tigerfish summer team, which is a member of the Central Maryland Swim League (CMSL) and is sanctioned by AAU.

Joe initially started volunteering with the Tigerfish to help set up for meets and work as a timer. He soon decided that he wanted to become an official and has been officiating ever since, both for the summer league and for the various year round club swimming teams his daughters eventually joined. Joe was invited to join the Tigerfish parent board in 2011, then he accepted the role of AAU representative on the CMSL board the following year, without fully understanding what the position would entail or even what AAU really was. Nonetheless, he enthusiastically tackled the role that would result in him becoming a valued member of the AAU community.

During the summer of 2012, Joe spent much of his time learning about the budding relationship between CMSL and AAU. He recognized the potential for a strong partnership and made it his goal to solidify those ties. As a result of his efforts, he was invited to attend the AAU annual banquet that fall with his older



daughter. They were the only two swimming representatives there, which further strengthened Joe's resolve to make swimming a larger part of the AAU world.

Joe began working closely with AAU's Ben and Antoinette Dubose and the CMSL board to increase awareness of AAU among the league's 50 or so swim teams and to help them understand the benefits of their AAU memberships. Joe was particularly instrumental in establishing the AAU Award for CMSL Leadership, to be awarded to up to two members of each summer team every year. This new award was very well-received by CMSL athletes, coaches, and team representatives, and there were 78 recipients of the award in 2013. In addition, three swim team parents were awarded the AAU Governor's Award for their life-saving efforts in an incident involving a coach who suffered a medical emergency.

Attendance at the AAU banquet increased from just Joe and his older daughter in 2012 to more than 100 CMSL athletes, family members, and coaches in 2013, becoming

the sport with the second-largest representation at the banquet. As awareness of AAU continued to grow throughout the swim league, the number of AAU/CMSL awards also continued to increase, culminating in 2016, when there were 98 athletes receiving the award, and when swimming became the sport with the most representatives at the banquet.

In the years since Joe first began working with AAU, he has earned the John G Considine award for Sport Director Membership as well as the William "Bill" Stevens club executive award multiple times. In addition, Joe has also been the recipient of the AAU Governors award multiple times. In 2021, Joe was awarded the AAU volunteer of the year award, an honor typically reserved for AAU leadership. Joe has also accepted numerous other awards on behalf of CMSL for their participation in AAU.



Joe's final summer working with CMSL and AAU was in 2022, more than 15 years after he first started volunteering as a swim parent, 10 years after becoming CMSL's AAU rep, and shortly before he and his family moved out of state. During that time, he took a relationship between CMSL and AAU that was in its infancy and grew it into a strong and successful partnership. Joe's devotion to the sport of swimming is truly unmatched, and his positive impact will be felt throughout Maryland for many years to come. Everyone at AAU would like to thank Joe for his many years of service, and we wish him well as he moves on to his new adventures with Minnesota swimming!

As his lung disease progressed, he medically retired from the Housing Authority of Baltimore City with more than 30 years of service.

However, refused to let his disease define or hinder his ability to coach football, assist with Maryland AAU Boys Basketball Tournaments and mentor young men. In December of 2019, He received a double lung transplant. During his recovery and the COVID-19 pandemic, he discussed on several occasions his return to coaching football. His love and dedication to positively impact the lives of youth and young adults he encountered kept his drive to return to not only attend many high school and college games continuing to






Cross Country / Track & Field
















SWIMMING

Building champions one stroke at a time!

AAU and the Central Maryland Swimming League (CMSL) work together to offer amateur sports programs through a volunteer base for all participants to have the physical, mental, and moral development of amateur athletes and to promote good sportsmanship and good citizenship.

CMSL leadership is entirely staffed by parent volunteers, from the board of directors to the team representatives.

The league is comprised of 49 teams separated into nine divisions across four counties and Baltimore City.

In partnership with AAU, CMSL works to provide competitive summer swimming programs for children of member pools to help advance aquatic skills, promote teamwork and principles of good sportsmanship, and develop a love of the sport.

The league is separated into divisions to accommodate a more competitive grouping of teams which is based on the performance of a team during the previous season and may change from year to year.

Each athlete, coach and team representative is an AAU member.

CMSL provides swimmers with several levels of competition to assist in their development as athletes and well-rounded individuals.

The official season consists of five dual or tri meets, a league-wide invitational meet called the Straehle championship meet, and divisional championship meets at the end of the season. All dual and tri meets are held at member pools, usually on Saturday mornings in June and July.

Many teams also organize additional inter-divisional and novice meets throughout the season to provide more opportunities for competition and fun.

All CMSL meets have the same event structure which is separated by age and gender.

The Central Maryland Swim League works to assure that both swimmers and parents alike have a positive athletic experience as well as a positive social interaction across all athletes and volunteers. With over 5,000 members, CMSL is the largest swimming organization within AAU!






