LAMONT GERMANY

Sports Anchor, XM-Satellite Radio, Co-Founder Heritage Sports Radio Network Master of Ceremonies

Lamont Germany is a 30 year veteran of the broadcast industry, who has enjoyed a varied and comprehensive multi-media career on the local, regional and national level. His career path has afforded an opportunity to experience the full broadcast gamut.

The Morgan State University graduate ('80), was born in Pittsburgh, PA and was bitten by the radio bug practically at birth. His father, Albert Germany (Al Gee) was a popular Dee-Jay in Pittsburgh, and later in Washington, D.C. and New York.

Germany grew up wanting to follow in his father footsteps, and got his first broadcast opportunity while a student at Morgan State University. Under the guidance of News Director Larry Dean and Program Director Kweisi Mfume, Germany interned in the newsroom at Morgan State University owned and operated WEAA-FM.

As a student reporter, he covered the gamut; politics, crime, arts, entertainment, and sports. His experience at WEAA served as the foundation for his career after graduation.

Germany's experience at WEAA led to other broadcast opportunities, including a stint at several of the highest rated stations in the Baltimore-Washington metropolitan area WPOC (FM 93) in Baltimore, MD. And WBAL-AM in Baltimore. At WBAL, Germany enjoyed a 12 year career as a news anchor and General Assignment reporter. During his WBAL tenure, he covered Baltimore City, Baltimore County and Maryland politics.

The emergence of new technologies in the industry eventually led to a strong interest in satellite radio. Germany was hired as a Sports Anchor at Sirius-XM Satellite radio in Washington, D.C.in April of 2005. At Sirius-XM, Germany was heard on a national platform. His work could be found on the various sports channels on the platform. Germany has also freelanced in Baltimore area high school sports.

He has had the opportunity to sit behind the microphone at high school football and basketball games since 1995. And in addition to his


experience on the high school level, he's also had the privilege of serving as the primary Play by Play voice of Morgan State University athletics.

Germany has been the "Voice of Morgan" since for more than three decades.

In 2007, Germany and several partners realized a career dream with the formation of the Heritage Sports Radio Network (HSRN). The network is dedicated to the national broadcast of HBCU athletics. It affords Historic Black Colleges and Universities a platform for exposure that previously did not exist. HSRN programming can be heard on Sirius-XM radio and 30 radio stations across the country.

Lamont Germany currently resides in Parkville, Maryland.







MD/AAU OUSTANDING ATHLETE AWARD

The MD/AAU Outstanding Athlete Award is presented to the athlete who excelled in performance in their respective sport, used their talents to best of their abilities and was motivated to excellence in athletic endeavors.

MD/AAU COACHES AWARD

The MD/AAU Coach Award is presented to coaches that through their major commitment of time, patience, and instruction make it possible for the many MD/AAU athletes to train and successfully compete. And through their understanding ways and their knowledge of the game embrace inspiration, motivation, and dedication as the building blocks that athletes need for success in sports and life. This award was established to give tribute to the outstanding architecting that Ralph Durant did with the Track and Field program of Baltimore City and the mentoring of youth and young adults in the program. Athletes are selected for their successes during the year's competitions in addition to their prowess at the National Junior Olympics and submitted to the Banquet Chairperson.

GOVERNOR'S AWARD



Lydia Cole - Elementary-Middle School - Jump Rope

Lydia Cole is an athlete, scholar, and community volunteer. Lydia's competitive career began in 2019 at the young age of 7 when she competed in her first AAU Winter Invitational. Since 2019 Lydia has consistently placed well in regional tournaments and she also began to experience national and international success. In 2020 she competed in a virtual international tournament through USA Jump Rope and earned several medals. Lydia attended her first AAU Junior Olympics in 2022 and found success in her age group as well as older divisions as she "jumped up" to compete with older teammates. The 2023 competition season was no different for Lydia and she came home with 14 medals including two Overall Gold Medals in both the Single Double Dutch and Pairs Double Dutch Triple Crowns in the 15-17 division at the AAU Junior Olympic Games. Even though Lydia again competed up several age divisions her skills matched those of her fellow competitors. Lydia worked hard to perfect and master the skills necessary for all her routines and you can often find her turning Double Dutch ropes in her signature split turning position. Lydia is also passionate about gymnastics and enjoys learning new skills, especially on the balance beam. This year Lydia will branch out from being solely a recreation team member and compete in her first gymnastics competition this November.

As a volunteer Lydia shares her passion for jump rope by educating others about the health benefits of jumping rope through community shows at various locations. Lydia is active in her church and volunteers her time in many ways. She helps others feel food secure by sorting food donations at her church's food pantry. Lydia also organizes holiday baskets for distribution each Thanksgiving. Lydia serves as a greeter and distributes programs at various events such as The Living Christmas Tree which is a local holiday tradition for many families. During the summer you can find Lydia at her local library helping children with tasks for the summer reading program. Lydia's passion for helping others does not end there as she also assists in the preschool program during the Sunday School hour at her church each week. Lydia is currently in the 7th grade and does well balancing all her passions and community activism while maintaining a 4.0 GPA.

Ruth Cole - Elementary-Middle School - Jump Rope

Ruthie "Ruthie" Cole is an athlete, community volunteer, and scholar. As both a jump roper and gymnast Ruthie spreads her love of sports with others. Her smile during her performances is contagious. Ruthie learned early on to demonstrate sportsmanship at all times especially while on the podium. At competitions Ruthie shares her smile and well wishes with those around her while receiving awards. Through AAU Jump Rope Ruthie has earned many regional and national/international medals. At the AAU Junior Olympics this past summer in lowa Ruthie earned the Overall Gold Medal in the 9-Year-Old Female Single Rope Events and the Overall Gold Medal in the 15-17 Double Dutch Pairs Events. A highlight for Ruthie was winning the Gold Medal in 12 and Under Single Double Dutch Freestyle with two jumpers from another jump rope team. Ruthie and her new friends met and created their routine the day before they competed in that event. In addition to the Overall Medals Ruthie brought home 10 other medals at this year's AAU Junior Olympic Games. When Ruthie is not jumping rope, she can be found tumbling and learning new skills in her recreation gymnastics class. Ruthie will begin competing in gymnastics this November.

As a community volunteer Ruthie can be found performing in community events from parades to health fairs to children's events with her jump rope. She enjoys sharing her sport with others and showing how exercise can be fun and exciting. Ruthie is also very active in her church. She serves as a greeter and welcomes visitors to her church and her favorite event is the Living Christmas Tree. At this event Ruthie welcomes others and passes out programs explaining the history of the Living Christmas Tree which began in 1985. Ruthie is also passionate about helping others feel food secure. To assist with this, she volunteers at her church's food pantry monthly and packages holiday baskets each Thanksgiving. Ruthie's talents outside of the gym also include a passion for singing and sharing her faith with others through the children's choir ministry at Oak Grove Baptist Church.

Ruthie is currently in the 5th grade and continues to excel in her classes. She is learning at a young age to balance her academics, sports, and volunteer endeavors while maintaining a 4.0 GPA.





Sarah Cole - High School - Jump Rope

Sarah is a dedicated student, athlete, and is involved in her community. She recently graduated (class of 2023), was homeschooled all thirteen years, and was dual enrolled at Harford Community College, where she is a member of their Honors College pursuing a degree in Actuarial Science.

Sarah is on the Hoppin' Hawks Jump Rope Team. This past competition season was her 6th year of competing in AAU Jump Rope. She participated in the 2023 AAU Junior Olympic Games where she won five individual gold medals in the Female 17-18 division. Sarah also earned four overall gold medals in her triple crown events, bringing home a total of 17 medals. She has also been awarded the AAU Outstanding Athlete award for Jump Rope in 2019, 2022, and 2023. Besides competing, Sarah performs with her team at local community and school events where she helps spread her love for the sport of jump rope. She teaches classes weekly for Hoppin' Hawks and instructs at their summer camps.

Sarah is also a dedicated student. She is a part of Harford Community College's Honors College where she participates in the Math Club and Mu Alpha Theta National Honor Society and is an officer for both. Sarah is also a member of the Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth as well as the National Science Foundation STEM Program and recipient of the S-STEM Scholarship. She was recognized on Harford Community College's 2023 Deans list

for achieving high academic honor and maintaining her high GPA.

Outside of her sport and school she is involved in her community and strives to serve her community. She is a member of the choir for Living Christmas Tree. She is a volunteer for the food pantry at her local church where she helps organize and distribute food as well as participates in their food drives for Thanksgiving food baskets and raises money for world hunger. She helps collect items and pack shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child, which is a project that collects and delivers shoe boxes filled with toys, hygiene items, and schools supplies to children in need around the world. She serves in her church's Preschool and Childrens Ministry.

Sarah works hard to be successful at sports, school, and in her community as well as working at Chick-Fil-A where she has been promot-

ed three times to shift supervisor and leads the shifts. These activities and opportunities have helped her become the leaderand person she is today.

Reagan Smith - High School - Jump Rope

Reagan Smith exemplifies a well-rounded High School student as a scholar, athlete, and community leader. Reagan is a junior at the Science and Math Academy at Aberdeen High School and is dual enrolled at Harford Community College where she maintains an overall GPA of 4.7. She has recently earned the "AP Scholar with Distinction" award, the highest award presented by the College Board. She intends to further her academic pursuits by attending a 4-year college with a double major in Biology and Biomedical Engineering, one day advancing to a PhD.

This past year was Reagan's 8th year of competing in jump rope. At the 2023 AAU Junior Olympic Games she won the overall Gold medal across all 4 Triple Crown disciplines, bringing home a total of 17 medals. She has also been recognized as a Maryland Outstanding Athlete for jump rope in 2017, 2022 and 2023. Along with competing Reagan performs in local and Regional Jump Rope performances sharing her love of the sport with young jumpers as a Junior Coach for the Hoppin' Hawks. Reagan is also involved within her school community. She is a passionate instrumentalist playing violin and viola in her school's



advanced Chamber Orchestra and All-County Orchestra. She participates in a variety of clubs and holds leadership positions for National English Honor Society, Key Club, and Women in STEM Club. Outside of school she dedicates her time to volunteering with Camp Inventions STEM Camp as a Leadership Intern fostering creativity in a safe and exciting learning environment, as well as being a Science and Math Academy Mentor helping freshman acclimate to the program by providing tutoring and building study habits. Reagan works hard to balance these activities as well as additional honor societies, art projects, and working part time. All these opportunities have not only helped her become a high performing student-athlete but the community leader she is today.



Darius Dunlap-Elkins - Elementary-Middle School - Track & Field

Darius Dunlap-Elkins distinguished himself in the 2023 AAU Junior Olympics by reaching the podium in each of four events that he competed. He placed 6th in the 400-meter dash, 4th in the 800-meter run, 3rd in the pentathlon, and 1st in the 1500-meter race walk.

This achievement represented Darius' second straight Junior Olympics in which he reached the podium, placing 2nd in the 1500-meter race walk and 5th in the triathlon in 2022. Although his previous two visits to the Junior Olympics in 2021 and 2019 did not result in him reaching the podium they provided a motivating experience for him to work harder to qualify in subsequent years.

Darius has tremendous athletic ability, as indicated by the variety of his events, and highlights every major facet of athleticism that he possesses: speed, endurance, coordination, strength, and power. These physical attributes were enhanced by his superior motivation, strong work ethic, and remarkable coachability. Darius' growth and development in Track and Field was helped by his early participation in Soccer at age three, followed by Flag Football at age 5,

and more recently Basketball. At age 6 while participating in Flag Football he displayed an unusual affinity for running, begging the coaches to run "one more lap" while the other kids were begging to stop.



Darius' athletic accomplishments are remarkable when one considers that beginning as a two-year-old he needed occupational therapy to assist with his balance and walking. He sets high standards for himself not only in sports, but also in school where he energetically seeks nothing less than high academic honors along with participation in such school activities as membership in the chess club. He even brought his newfound love for chess home where he attempted to teach his brothers and sister how to play. He possesses all the traits of good character, including dependability, kindness, consideration, and compassion, all of which are on prominent display when consoling his competitors who may not have performed well or volunteering with Happy Helpers for the Homeless. Darius is simply a super individual!

<u>Lydia Cole – Hoppin Hawks – Elementary-Middle School – Jump Rope</u>

Lydia Cole has been jumping rope from a very young age. By having four siblings older than her who all jumped rope she grew up in the sport. Lydia began competing in 2019 at the age of seven. Even from her first AAU Winter Invitational Tournament she began earning awards as she excelled in speed and power events for her age and worked to memorize choreography that her older siblings helped her with for her freestyle routine. This past year Lydia demonstrated perseverance well beyond her years. Lydia earned many ribbons and medals at our two regional events this season before heading to this year's Junior Olympic Games. At this year's competition in Greensboro, Lydia had to compete with two new groups and create new routines 2-2.5 months before the games. Her new groups required that she move to older divisions and the 10 almost 11-year-old now found herself competing in the 13-14 division for single Double Dutch and the 15-17 division for pairs Double Dutch. Lydia grew so much through this experience and winning awards with her new teammates was an added bonus. At the 2022 AAU Junior Olympics Lydia earned the overall silver medal in the 15-17 division with her Double Dutch pairs team along with medals in several component events. While her 13-14 single Double Dutch team did not earn any medals, they consistently placed in the top 10 for all events. Lydia and her younger sister were the overall silver medalists in the Single Rope Pairs Triple Crown. Additionally, Lydia earned the overall bronze medal in the Female Single Rope Triple Crown events in her age group. When Lydia is not performing with Hoppin' Hawks Jump Rope Team at various community events you can find her tumbling and flipping in gymnastics class. She also enjoys volunteering in the community. You can find her at her local library branch helping children complete their summer reading program tasks or at her church food pantry sorting donations.

Regan Smith - Hoppin Hawks - High School - Jump Rope

Since she found the sport of Jump Rope at five years of age Reagan Smith can often be found with a rope in her hand. Beginning at the age of nine Reagan began performing and competing with Hoppin' Hawks Jump Rope Team. In 2017 at her first AAU Junior Olympic Games in Detroit, Michigan she earned many ribbons and medals and was excited to be recognized upon returning home as an AAU Maryland Outstanding Athlete. Over the years Reagan has continued to grow in the sport and share her love for Jump Rope with anyone who will listen. In 2019 Reagan competed at the USA Jump Rope Nationals as well as in her second AAU Junior Olympic Games. In Greensboro Reagan worked with jumpers on our team as well as other teams at this tournament and again earned many awards. During the 2022 season Regan competed on both the regional and national level for AAU Jump Rope. At the regional tournament Reagan was the Overall Gold Medalist in the 15-16 Female division as well as the Overall Silver Medalist in the 15-17 division for Single Double Dutch. At the 2022 AAU Junior Olympic Games Reagan earned the overall silver medal in the 15-16 Female Single Rope Triple Crown with other medals in the component events including a silver medal for freestyle. Along with her pairs partner she earned the Overall Bronze Medal in the 15-17 Single Rope Pairs Triple Crown and a silver medal in the freestyle component event where their score was only 0.1 less than the gold medal winners. Both Reagan's single and pairs Double Dutch teams placed 4th overall and earned medals in several of the component events. Outside of Jump Rope, Reagan challenges herself academically as a student at the Science and Math Academy where she is a sophomore and maintains a 4.8 GPA. She is also an active member in Key Club, Mu Alpha Theta (Math National Honor Society), Red Cross Club, and Women in STEM. Reagan excels at playing both the violin and viola and enjoys performing with her school orchestra.

Sarah Grace Cole - Hoppin Hawks - High School - Jump Rope

Sarah Cole has been jumping rope with Hoppin' Hawks Jump Rope Team for the past seven years. She advanced quickly through our program and has been performing and competing ever since. Over the years Sarah has earned many medals and ribbons and she earned her first AAU Maryland Athlete of the Year in 2019. In 2022 she was excited to again attend the AAU Junior Olympics in Greensboro, North Carolina and the event was a huge success for her. Since her last Junior Olympics, Sarah has worked hard to improve her speed and power scores and learn new freestyle skills to enhance her routines. At this year's games she earned the overall bronze medal in the Female 15-16 Single Rope Triple Crown. In the power event for this triple crown, she tied for the Gold medal. Along with her pairs partner she earned the overall Bronze medal in the 15-17 Single Rope Pairs Triple Crown. Sarah's Double Dutch pairs freestyle team earned the overall Silver medal in the Triple Crown event and this group only came to work together about 2-2.5 months before the competition. While her single Double Dutch team did not place overall they earned many top 10 awards. In the 4 Person Single Rope Freestyle Sarah's group earned the bronze medal. At regional events Sarah also experienced much success this year with many top 5 places as well as multiple gold, silver, and bronze medals. When Sarah is not jumping, she is leading others at her job at Chick-fil-a where she has worked for over a year and serves as a Senior Team Captain. Sarah is dual enrolled in both high school where she is homeschooled and the honors program at our local community college. Recently she has been awarded the Harford Community College Honors Scholarship and Harford Community College Presidential Grant-Dually Enrolled. In addition to performing with Hoppin' Hawks Jump Rope Team at community events and area schools she also performs in her church choir. In 2022 holiday season, she performed in her church's living Christmas Tree which many area families consider a holiday tradition.



He has demonstrated his athleticism in hundreds of performances over the past 11 years, including community events, college basketball half-time shows, and even the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. He shares his passion and gives back to the team by teaching Jump Rope classes; coaching the performing team; and being a team captain. He has taught classes ranging from Beginner to Adult. He has also traveled to other teams to volunteer to teach others about Jump Rope and volunteered his time in Baltimore and in Howard County Title 1 schools teaching Jump Rope after school. In order to spread the passion for Jump Rope, Mason also applied and was selected to be of the AMJRF Jump Rope Ambassadors.

Isla has competed across the United States as well as internationally in Norway and been nationally and internally recognized in the sport of Jump Rope. Some of the awards Isla have earned are listed, however, the one she is most proud of is the 1st Place award for 15-16 Female Individual Overall at the 2022 AAU Junior Olympic Games.

Outside of Jump Rope, Isla is involved in numerous school activities, non-academic extracurriculars, and community organizations. One of her examples of community involvement is her work as Chief Marketing Officer for the Health Care Workers vs Hunger organization. Through this position, she helped to raise over \$427,000 for food banks in under a week in December 2021 and is planning to continue this position

indefinitely. Isla also won the Presidential Volunteer Service award through the Points of Light organization for completing over 100 hours of volunteer service as Chief Marketing Officer. Other community involvement includes packing meals and sewing pillowcases at the local church; volunteering at an assisted-living center; and helping out with clean-up and organizing at the Kangaroo Kids when she was injured.

Within school, Isla was elected Class of 2023 student Government Association (SGA) Secretary in 11th grade and spent many hours planning events; speaking to members of her class for their input on new ideas and collaborating with fellow SGA members and adult supervisors. Sydney followed up that performance by placing 2nd overall in the 14 Girls' 100m Hurdles with a time of 14.43. Sydney also competed in the 200m Dash and the 4x100m Relay at the Junior Olympics.

Sydney is also an outstanding student that learned to speak Hebrew when she was in elementary school and now attends the IG Academy in Bradenton, FL. Sydney is an honor student finishing the 2022 school year with a 3.6 GPA and is currently taking honor classes as a 9th grader. Cross Country / Track & Field

Athletes from the Maryland AAU District delivered exceptional performances at this year's Junior Olympic Games in Des Moines, Ohio, hosted at Drake University. With 60 individuals and 18 relay teams achieving podium success and earning All-American status, they secured impressive placements ranging from 1st to 8th. Noteworthy achievements include Darius Dunlap-Elkins' four-time podium presence as a National Champion, Patricio Pardo's three-time National Champion and new National Record holder, and repeated podium appearances by Leila Wiseman, Laila Mallory, and National Champion Grace Love.








JUMP ROPE

SWIMMING

Building champions one stroke at a time!

The AAU and the Central Maryland Swimming League (CMSL) work together to offer amateur sports programs through a volunteer base for all participants to have the physical, mental, and moral development of amateur athletes and to promote good sportsmanship and good citizenship.

CMSL leadership is entirely staffed by parent volunteers, from the board of directors to the team representatives.

The league is comprised of 48 teams separated into nine divisions across four counties and Baltimore City.

In partnership with AAU, CMSL works to provide competitive summer swimming programs for children of member pools to help advance aquatic skills, promote teamwork and principles of good sportsmanship, and develop a love of the sport.

The league is separated into 8 divisions to accommodate a more competitive grouping of teams which is based on the performance of a team during the previous season and may change from year to year.

Each athlete, coach and team representative is an AAU member.

CMSL provides swimmers with several levels of competition to assist in their development as athletes and well-rounded individuals.

The official season consists of five dual or tri meets, a league-wide invitational meet called the Straehle championship meet, and divisional championship meets at the end of the season. All dual and tri meets are held at member pools, usually on Saturday mornings in June and July.

Many teams also organize additional inter-divisional and novice meets throughout the season to provide more opportunities for competition and fun.

All CMSL meets have the same event structure which is separated by age and gender.

The Central Maryland Swim League works to assure that both swimmers and parents alike have a positive athletic experience as well as a positive social interaction across all athletes and volunteers. With over 5,000 members, CMSL is the largest swimming organization within AAU!




















